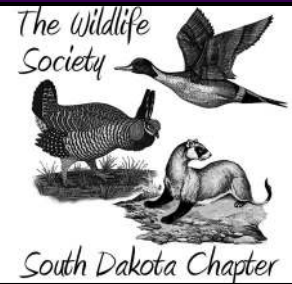

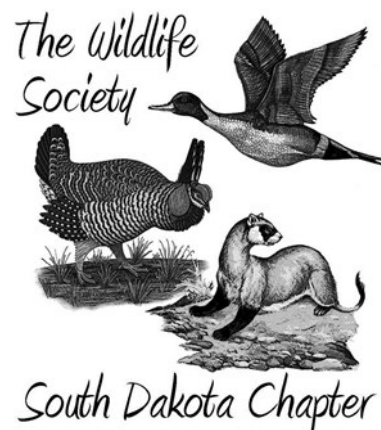

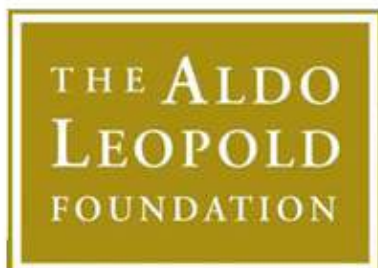

Candidate for President Elect—Joshua Stafford

Dr. Joshua Stafford is a Waterfowl Ecologist with the U.S. Geological Survey's South Dakota Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit, where he serves as Assistant Unit Leader and is an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Natural Resource Management at South Dakota State University. Prior to this position, he was Director of the Stephen A. Forbes Biological Station and Frank C. Bellrose Waterfowl Research Center with the Illinois Natural History Survey. Recent research interests focus on factors influencing onset of migration in waterfowl, condition of waterfowl that use agricultural landscapes, and ways to improve habitat management for multiple avian species. He is an avid waterfowl hunter, and he and his chocolate lab, Typha, enjoy spending the fall in the marshes of South Dakota.

Former Volga resident receives national award

Ken Higgins of Brookings, a former rural Volga resident was recently presented with a Fellow Award from The Wildlife Society at their 22nd annual conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. The membership of The Wildlife Society totals over 9,000 individuals in one of 42 different countries.

The TWS Fellow Award recognizes members of the Society who have distinguished themselves through exceptional service to the society and to the wildlife profession during their career. They are encouraged to engage in TWS activities that will benefit and promote the society and the wildlife profession as a whole.

Higgins joined The Wildlife Society in 1963 while a student at Colorado State University in Fort Collins. During his career Ken has served TWS in various leadership capacities including being president of the North Dakota Chapter, the South Da-

kota Chapter, and the Central Mountain and Plains sections of TWS. In 1998, Higgins was elected as the first recipient of the Fellow Award of the South Dakota Academy of Science. He retired in January 2006 after a career of 40-plus years of service as a Wildlife Research Biologist with the U.S. Department of the Interior; for 20 years, he held a joint appointment as a university professor and as the assistant leader of the SD Cooperative Fish & Wildlife Unit at South Dakota State University and the SD Cooperative Fish & Wildlife Research Unit in Brookings. Higgins continues to be active with the University and The Wildlife Society in a Professor Emeritus capacity.

The award winner currently resides in Brookings where he spends time writing and publishing books and research articles for various journals.

APPLY NOW FOR 2016 LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

The Wildlife Society (TWS) is currently accepting applications for its Leadership Institute. The Institute's goal is to facilitate the development of new leaders within TWS and the wildlife profession. The Institute will recruit 10-15 promising early-career professionals for a series of intensive activities and mentoring relationships. The focus will be on exposing the participants to the inner workings of TWS and increasing the number of active leaders in TWS and the wildlife profession.

From May until October, participants will engage in a series of activities to develop and expand their leadership skills. Institute members will attend the TWS Annual Conference in Raleigh, North Carolina (October 14-19, 2016) and participate in various activities, including mentoring and leadership workshop sessions. The Institute is free, and participants receive free registration and a travel grant to attend the conference.

Participation in the Institute is geared toward early-career professionals who are 2 to 3 years out of school (either undergraduate or graduate school), currently working full-time in a wildlife professional position, and have demonstrated evidence of their leadership potential. Also eligible are more recent graduates who have shown strong evidence of their leadership potential and those who are working while concurrently pursuing a graduate degree. All applicants must be dues-paying members of TWS and a Chapter or Section of TWS. The selection committee will be seeking to create a diverse group with participants of varying gender, ethnic, and regional diversity. Selection will be based upon:

- An excellent academic record
- Demonstrated leadership capability or potential
- Demonstrated level of excellence in current position
- Commitment to and involvement in TWS

Preference will be given to individuals who are certified as Associate Wildlife Biologists® or Certified Wildlife Biologists®, or who have submitted such an application to TWS.

Applicants must submit (in one PDF, excluding online application form and recommendation letters):

- Application form (available at <http://wildlife.org/LIApplication-2016>)
- Cover letter with evidence of leadership capacity or potential, such as previous leadership positions held in TWS Chapters or Student Chapters or in other organizations
- Résumé including a list of publications, awards, etc.
- Academic transcript/s
- 2 letters of recommendation from supervisors, academic advisors, professors, or others in leadership positions with whom you have worked and who are familiar with your leadership potential, commitment to TWS, and commitment to wildlife management and conservation
 - Letters should be emailed directly to leadership@wildlife.org, subject line "Leadership Institute Recommendation for [applicant last name]"
- An essay (1000 word limit), which succinctly summarizes (1) your concept of leadership, (2) your aspiration for your role within TWS in 5 to 10 years, and (3) why you are an ideal candidate for the Institute
